What's Happening at the Corner?

ornerstone is on the move! I have been here now for 15 months and we are off to great things. Last June, the Annual Conference offered an opportunity to grow and sustain their ministry through the Ministry Incubator initiative. Cornerstone expressed interest and we have been selected to participate. The New York Annual Conference is working to become an incubator for creative, sustainable new ministries, particularly in partnership with young people.

The selected cohorts are comprised of emerging ministry leaders in the Conference that feel noticed, trained and empowered to innovate impactful ministry in their respective communities.

About midway through, a Hatchathon will be hosted where leaders are provided intense training and an energizing accelerator for each initiative. All of the cohorts will come together for maximum momentum and impact. Innovation will begin to be kneaded into the core identity of the Conference, as evidenced in its way of doing ministry with emerging ministry leaders, ideally youth. The Conference is making a commitment to "new frontier" ministries with emerging leaders.

Cornerstone will "pitch" its initiative in the coming weeks, planning for the first week in October. What are we doing, you ask? We are going to charter three new Troops for BSA (formerly Boy Scouts of America). Wait. That's not innovative! Well, sure it is. The troops will be based in South Norwalk focusing on youth of color. The model will be different and based on the Rites of Passage for Young Men and Women that I have previously developed. BSA Executives are working with us to weave both Rites of Passage and Scouting throughout the programming. We think it will work. Both have made huge impacts in young people and we think it is a perfect fit.

Why three Troops? For maximum outreach. One troop for Cub Scouts (ages 5-10), One troop for BSA - Females (ages 10-17), and BSA - Males (ages 10-17). If you want to know how you can get involved, then be on the lookout for our "pitch" coming soon in a link to you. We need all your help and support and participation. This will be the perfect way for the church community to maximize what we have been doing well for the last 90 years in a new fresh way. Sincerely,

The United Methodist Church and the General Commission on Religion and Race invite all United Methodists and friends to take part in 30 DAYS OF ANTI-RACISM. They introduced the project for the month of September, but it can be carried out at any time. Below is a calendar with a suggested activity for each day of the month. Many have links to other materials. All are interesting and rewarding.

Here is their explanation of how the project came about:

"Campus minister Morgan Stafford has committed himself to live an anti-racist faith and life. "As a white man, I have learned that I've benefitted from racism, while people of color have been harmed. I believe that white Christians must take the lead to confront and dismantle racism. It's our job."

To focus and make tangible his beliefs, Morgan spent the month of June doing at least one thing every day to listen to, learn from, do, and become more anti-racist, reporting his progress via social media. We at GCORR liked the idea and reached out to Morgan to share his story, what he accomplished, and how it's changed and enhanced his spiritual growth and his work with young people.

As a result, GCORR invites white allies (and others) to spend one month doing #30DaysAntiRacism. Please post photos of your activities using #30DaysAntiRacism and encourage your friends, members of your congregation, Sunday school class, pastors, and community partners to join this 30 day project." Let us all at Cornerstone, commit to following this guideline for the month of October, and let us support each other in our small groups to work at it together.

We are looking at ways to dismantle racism by supporting local organizations both financially and with physical presence. Cornerstone Council has commissioned us to research and recommend organizations where we can be most effective.

We also are considering how we as a congregation can become better informed, how we can bring about change, and how we can connect with the community beyond our plot of land to accomplish shared goals.

The weekly letters that you have been receiving from the Justice team for Church and Society is a start in that direction. The United Methodist Church, both locally and nationally, has been producing excellent webinars, videos, books, and discussions on this topic. We will continue to keep you informed.

Hatching New Ministries

The September 9 newsletter from the NYAC Office of Connectional Ministries contained this item:

"Cornerstone Community Church, Norwalk, CT - Liz Abel, Team Leader

Cornerstone, the product of four merged congregations, is a 250-member church with a weekly attendance of around 70. This new faith community is entering into a season of reimagining what its ministry to young people can look like, especially through an increase in outreach and recruitment and a diversification of the church's leadership team.

Pastor Liz imagines exploring new paradigms of church, such as a gathering space that tends to the spiritual and general needs of the community, perhaps functioning like a pop-up or "messy" church that remains on the move and ready when and where it becomes needed. In addition, Pastor Liz is interested in identifying where Norwalk's young people are developmentally, spiritually, and physically (where do they live? where do they hang out? etc.). She would like to test multiple ideas through a series of quick, experimental launches to identify key learnings about what best addresses young people in their neighborhood in a short period of time.

Current challenges include diversifying the leadership team, particularly in the realm of engaging more youth who identify as Latinx, and in developing leadership for church camp programs."

We are raising our profile. We need to work together to live up to our reputation.

Grete Nyrop, September 9, 1929 - August 8, 2020



Grete Nyrop, 90, died at St. Vincent's Medical Center in Bridgeport, CT. She was born in Denmark. Her parents were Karen Locoppidan-Jensen and Frederik Jeppesen and her stepfather, Jens Jericho. Grete lived and was educated in Copenhagen and became a nurse, an early indicator of her lifelong devotion to the care of others. She married Per Nyrop, in June, 1954, and they immigrated to Baltimore, MD, in 1955. In

1959, Grete and Per moved to Norwalk, CT, where they resided for many years. Grete moved to Shelton, CT, following Per's death in 1988.

Grete was a wonderful mother and caregiver to young children. She devoted her time to her three children when they were young, and once they were older and in school, she spent many years caring for patients in a pediatric practice. Her care and compassion to others extended well beyond home and work and she was involved in scouting, PTA, and her church. She lived with her daughter, Nina, for many years and had the good fortune to be very involved in caring for, nurturing, and supporting her grandchildren.

Grete's church community was a very special and important part of her life. Her work with this community was a product of her core principals of caring for others, faith in the goodness of people, and love of

God. Grete set a standard that others looked up to.

Grete traveled extensively with friends and visited many countries and continents. She was very adventurous, including driving across the country with her daughter, Karin, to Seattle, where Karin moved to attend college. For many years later in life, she traveled to Denmark to visit with her sister, Lisa, and many relatives. Lisa and Grete also traveled as part of Grete's visits to Denmark. Her lust for life was on display in the last couple of visits because, even though she had difficulty navigating airports, she nevertheless traveled alone, and insisted on doing so to see the people she loved.

Grete is survived by her son Jan, daughters Karin and Nina and their families, and sister Lisa of Denmark.

In recognition of Grete's lifetime of caring for others, contributions can be made to the Alzheimer's Association, in honor of her sister, Lisa.

A celebration of Grete's life will be arranged at a later date when travel and gatherings are safe.

Stemming Food Insecurities in Norwalk by Christina Wyclif

Food insecurity has been a big problem around the world and in our community for a long time. Since the pandemic began, thousands of people have been laid off leaving them struggling to provide meals for their family. For the past few months Cornerstone CC has been providing "Blessing Boxes" for the community. These are 30-40 pound boxes of groceries enough to feed a family of 4 for about 2 weeks. Some of the organizations we work with are Open Door Shelter, Person-to-Person, NAACP, Norwalk Community Health Center, Family and Children's Agency, and many more. We are now distributing over 700 boxes to over 10 different agencies in Norwalk and surrounding towns. We are so grateful for the opportunity to continue to help our community out in any way we can and we would appreciate the support of our congregation!



Hispanic Heritage Month

Hispanic Heritage Month is celebrated September 15 to October 15.

Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Chile, and Belize all celebrate their independence days in September.

In the United Methodist Church, the Hispanic caucus is MARCHA, Methodists Associated with the Cause of Hispanic/Latino Americans.

The new President of the United Methodist Council of Bishops is Bishop Cynthia Fierro-Harvey.

In an interview with Barbara Dunlap-Berg for United Methodist Communications in 2013, Bishop Fierro-Harvey gave this condensed statement about her background:



I was born on May 5, 1959, in Big Spring, Texas. I was raised in a typical Hispanic neighborhood surrounded by family. My grandparents lived across the street, and my great-aunt and uncle lived next door. I have no memory of ever being with a babysitter but always with family. Being in community is a cornerstone of who I am.

I grew up on what some called "the wrong side of the tracks." My parents' home was a very modest home built by my father and grandfather. I remember two bedrooms, one bathroom and five people. It was also the house with the Virgin Mary in the front yard!

I am married to Dean Alan Harvey, and our daughter, Elizabeth Grace Harvey, is 22. I was raised in a Roman Catholic household. I am the first non-Catholic in my family. Foundry was the place where I discerned my call.

Throughout my high school years, I was active in student government, was a cheerleader and very involved in school activities.

I attended The University of Texas at Austin, graduating in 1980 with a degree in journalism.

I had a full career in corporate marketing prior to entering full-time ministry. I used to pride myself in having been a layperson longer than (I was) clergy, but (that is no longer the case).

My parents both had eighth-grade educations but were the smartest people I have ever known.

No fue hasta que fui a la universidad que comencé a asistir a una iglesia metodista unida, primero a la Iglesia Metodista Unida Dunwoody en Georgia, luego a la Iglesia Metodista Unida Foundry en Houston, que fue la iglesia desde la que entré al ministerio. "Christian Principles in an Election Year" Offer Criteria for Judging Candidates

he National Council of Churches USA has released 10 principles for evaluating candidates that it hopes all Christians from liberals to conservatives—will study and apply in this election year.

These points align closely with the United Methodist Social Principles.

Our Christian faith compels us to address the world through the lens of our relationship to God and to one another. Public discourse is enhanced as we engage civic leaders on the values and

ethics affirmed by our faith. At the same time, religious liberty and the integrity of our democracy will be protected as candidates refrain from using faith-based organizations and institutions for partisan gain. We offer these ten principles to those seeking to accept the responsibility that comes with holding public office.

1. War is contrary to the will of

God. While the use of violent force may, at times, be a necessity of last resort, Christ pronounces his blessing on the peacemakers. We look for political leaders who will make peace with justice a top priority and who will actively seek nonviolent solutions to conflict.

2. God calls us to live in communities shaped by peace and cooperation. We reject policies that abandon large segments of our inner city and rural populations to hopelessness. We look for political leaders who will rebuild our communities and bring an end to the cycles of violence and killing.

3. God created us for each other, and thus our security depends on the well-being of our global neighbors. We look for political leaders for whom a foreign policy based on cooperation and global justice is an urgent concern.

4. God calls us to be advocates for those who are most vulnerable in our society. We look for political leaders who yearn for economic justice

and who will seek to reduce the growing disparity between rich and poor.

5. Each human being is created in the image of God and is of infinite worth. We look for political leaders who actively promote racial justice and equal opportunity for everyone.

6. The earth belongs to God and is intrinsically good. We look for political leaders who recognize the earth's goodness, champion environmental justice, and uphold our responsibility to be stewards of God's creation.

> 7. Christians have a biblical mandate to welcome strangers. We look for political leaders who will pursue fair immigration policies and speak out against xenophobia.

8. Those who follow Christ are called to heal the sick. We look for political leaders who will support adequate, affordable and accessible health care for all.

9. Because of the transforming power of God's grace, all humans are called to be in right relationship with each other. We look for political leaders who seek a restorative, not retributive, approach to the criminal justice system and the individuals within it.

10. Providing enriched learning environments for all of God's children is a moral imperative. We look for political leaders who will advocate for equal educational opportunity and abundant funding for children's services.

Finally, our religious tradition admonishes us not to bear false witness against our neighbor and to love our enemies. We ask that the campaigns of political candidates and the coverage of the media in this election season be conducted according to principles of fairness, honesty and integrity.
