As we emerge from sheltering in place after being vaccinated and begin to enter the community at large, we should view this time as our resurrection. This is an opportunity for us to emerge anew. Same faith, same God, same person; new outlook on life and living.

Cornerstone is on the move. Though our building has been closed, we have continued to work and have become the cornerstone of the community. So what’s next? We continue.

Food insecurity in the community continues, and our feeding ministries have not slowed down. However, funds are low. Our Blessing Boxes line has no more funds to continue this effort. We are gearing up for local fundraisers: Restaurant night at Chipotle in Darien and Trivia Night at The Spread in South Norwalk. See the flyers in this issue for how you can support.

Our work in race equity continues as our committee on Church and Society continue with their movie watch parties, book studies, and Bible study, local work with our membership in CONECT, and new youth ministries with the Rites of Passage programs: The Timothy Project and Deborah’s Academy. Stay tuned for more information.

In-person gathering preparation is in full motion. The sanctuary and building are being prepared, cleaned, and marked for appropriate social distancing. We are increasing our technology in the sanctuary to continue our Zoom option, as well as live streaming. Meeting rooms are being prepared to support a hybrid option with the purchasing of additional technology.

Renovations on the Parish House are in motion and grants and support funding are being sought after to renovate the towers and roof of the church building, and the sanctuary will be refreshed.

We are a resurrection people and now is the time to live again and be active members of the Cornerstone family. We are on the move, and the community is ready to come through our doors for spiritual relief and to support our continuing ministry efforts that promote the development and growth of the Beloved Community in Norwalk.

We are prayerfully and diligently working to open Sunday Worship by Pentecost Sunday, May 23rd.

We will have hybrid options and notifications will be sent to all chairpersons when available.

We are in need of additional technological support to ensure an interactive live stream. As the Reopening team is getting prepared, be sure to read the guidelines for reopening.

Helping the Disadvantaged Among Us...

Rev. Abel is leading the way for the church to make a difference for the most disadvantaged in our community. On April 1, the Connecticut General Assembly Commission on Women, Children, Seniors, Equity and Opportunity presented one of its Shero awards to Rev. Abel, in honor of Women's History Month, for going above and beyond duty for the community over the past year, especially during the pandemic. See their announcement on the adjoining page.

The Alliance for Community Empowerment recognized Rev. Abel with their Community Service Award to be presented during their Board meeting on May 27th.

She is a Board member of UM City Society, serving on the Mission and Outreach Committee – they are updating and making more accessible the scholarship form that previously went through the Conference Parish Development Board. This is to ensure that churches can apply for grants on a rolling basis and can complete the process even if administrative support is not available to them.

She is a Board member of the Norwalk Acts, serving on the Implementation Team as a member of the faith-based community.

She is a part of the Social Emotional Learning Pillar and Race Equity Pillar.

She is on the Bishop's Pathway to Antiracism Team, which meets bi-weekly to develop strategy.

She has guided our church to provide space for a vaccination clinic with the Norwalk Community Health Center on May 8.

We are hoping to receive a grant from Connecticut Institute for Refugees and Immigrants to provide rental assistance relief.

We are the lead agency in partnership with Norwalk Acts in organizing Community Resource Fairs at different locations in the city, where organizations meet with the public to provide awareness of social service agencies and programs that are available to help with food, housing, health care, and other basic needs.

For several months now, I have been active in participating with the laity segment of our cooperative parish, the group of six United Methodist churches in our geographic area. We share ideas for ministry and possible joint efforts. For instance, the sewing machines that surfaced in the clean-out earlier this year of our Parish House have created some interest. They may be useful in a female Eagle Scout project. Also, Rev. Maria Pia, a deacon at Jesse Lee, has a ministry called Peacework that involves contemplative prayer with sewing and knitting.

We have invited the other churches in the cooperative to our movie nights. Other projects that we can undertake individually or jointly include:

- To become a composting center and generate a composting guidebook
- To create a pollinator pathway. Norwalk and other towns in the area are already part of this project, so we could participate.

Also, the Connecticut Food Bank continues to distribute on Wednesdays. However, due to the beach opening, the location has moved from Calf's Pasture Beach to Veterans' Park.

We look forward to exploring other avenues of working together.

Report from the Church and Society Committee

Church and Society has been meeting monthly since last fall. While our range of responsibility covers anything to do with social justice and the health and thriving of all humans, we have been concentrating this year on the most dominant problem in our church and society of racism. We read and discussed the book, *So You Want to Talk about Race?* by Ijeoma Oluo, an entertaining and enlightening presentation of multiple aspects of racial disparity and injustice in our country. There is always more to learn. Even those of us who think we are aware of the travesties that occur, found new ways to understand how white privilege permeates our society, unnoticed except by those who suffer from it.

We watched and discussed the superb PBS program “The Black Church,” in March. We highly recommend it to everyone.

To invite the whole congregation into the conversation, we have been hosting monthly Zoom watch parties of movies with social justice content. We have seen “Blindspotting,” “Hidden Figures,” and the children’s short “Whitewashing.” Most recently we watched “Les Miserables,” to coordinate with our Lenten study series on that novel. All of these have generated stimulating discussions, often leading people to describe some of their own experiences.

We will continue to offer these movie showings and hope you will join us.

Led by Pastor Liz, Lay Leader Pat Bobwich, and Christina Wyclif, our church continues to serve as a coordinating center for distribution of food to homeless and food insecure people in Norwalk and surrounding areas. This project requires funding. While other community organizations contribute, we will need to raise more support. See news of fundraisers elsewhere in this issue.

Currently, Pastor Nikki Edleman, of our cooperative parish churches in Wilton and South Salem, is leading a study and discussion series on the Bible and social justice issues. It is thought-provoking, eye-opening, and invaluable. It meets by Zoom at 7:00 on Monday evenings.

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IN MEMORIAM

Edwin L. Sisson 1941-2021



On February 9, 2021 Edwin Leonard Sisson, 79, of Norwalk, CT passed away peacefully at Connecticut Hospice. The son of Edwin and Clara Sisson, Ed was born in Unadilla, New York on October 23, 1941. He grew up in Unadilla and graduated from Unadilla Central School in 1961. He later enlisted in the army where he served in the Vietnam war and was honorably discharged in 1966.

After leaving the army, Ed attended SUNY Delhi and graduated in 1969 with a degree in Civil Engineering. He worked for the State of Connecticut DOT before retiring in 2002 after 29 years. He enjoyed his job and loved telling his children about all the places he surveyed.

Ed loved his family. He leaves behind two children and a grandchild: his son Edwin Danielak and son-in-law Jason; his daughter Jennifer Carney and son-in-law Steven, and his grandson Chase. He also had a wife Sumin and stepson Yang, both of whom moved back to China several years prior to his passing.

Ed loved spending time with his family. He adored his grandson and enjoyed playing with him and going for walks together. He also loved going to see his relatives in New York, and looked forward to attending their annual family reunion every year. He was very interested in genealogy and spent lots of time looking into the Sisson family history and finding long-lost relatives. He would get so excited every time he found a new relative and would tell his daughter all about it.

Ed was also an active member of his church community, often leading weekly prayer groups. He always helped out with church social activities and was well-known by his church family for his delicious pies. He had a passion for learning, and was especially interested in learning to speak Mandarin and finding out new facts about Chinese culture. He taught English to non-English speakers and loved learning their languages in return. He also enjoyed traveling, often visiting China with his wife. Ed had an extremely kind and generous nature—he was always the first to offer help to anyone in need. He will be greatly missed by the many people whose lives he touched with his caring and generosity.

Due to the pandemic, services for Ed are being held off until the summer, at which time a memorial service will be held at Cornerstone Community Church in Norwalk, CT. Midge Brown, 96, of Westport, Connecticut, passed away peacefully on April 19, 2021, with her family by her side. She was born on June 14, 1924 to the late John and Edith Irving, and had resided in Westport since 1979. She graduated from Norwalk High School in 1941 and later attended Katharine Gibbs College and Norwalk Community College. She spent many years of her career as an executive secretary, working for Machlett Labs, General Electric, Exxon Chemical, and Richardson Vicks, among others. She also worked as a secretary for the Norwalk United Methodist Church, and later as a real estate agent. At Machlett Labs she met her husband, Harry W. Brown, Sr. Together they had two children. She retired in 1989 at the age of 65.

Midge enjoyed many hobbies. She loved to read and always had books to lend out to others. Throughout her career, she took several art courses; after retiring, she began painting again and won several prizes for her art. She enjoyed owning and breeding Bichon Frise dogs. She was extremely proud of the yard and garden she personally maintained into her 90s at her home in Saugatuck Shores. Midge was a fierce competitor in family slap solitaire games. She enjoyed playing golf and bridge, was an active member and treasurer for the Norwalk Woman's Club, and was involved in many church activities. Midge was a wonderful hostess and cook, and her home near the water became a favorite gathering place for parties and get togethers.

She is survived by two children, daughter Linda K. Brown (Raymond Buckland), of Columbia, CT, and son Harry W. Brown, Jr. (Laurie), of Doylestown, PA; two granddaughters, Alexa L. Siegfried (Edward) and Jessica K. Fine (Noam); and two great-grandchildren, Aimee and Maxwell Siegfried. She is also survived by three siblings, Ruth Tanner, Joan Johnson, and William Irving, as well as numerous nieces and nephews. In addition to her parents, Midge was predeceased by her beloved husband, Harry Sr., who passed away in 1995, and her siblings Jack Irving and Norma Wagner. Midge will always be remembered as a loving wife, mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt, sister, and friend. She was interred at Riverside Cemetery, Norwalk, CT, next to her husband, and services were private. Bishop Bickerton Worships with Cornerstone



On April 11, the Sunday after Easter, Bishop Bickerton shared our worship service and preached an Easter message for us. After the service, he accepted questions from the congregation about the current state of the United Methodist Church.

Some of the subjects addressed:

- How to work through issues that arise in the course of a “cross-racial appointment” such as we have. As Pastor Liz remarked, she is a Black clergywoman serving a majority white congregation. Inevitably, she confronts a range of reactions, both within and beyond the church walls. The Bishop said that the appointment of Pastor Liz to Norwalk was a very deliberate and intentional decision. We are in a time and place with the ability to make a significant difference in the church and the community. He said, she is one of the most gifted and capable pastors in the New York Annual Conference, which, of course, we knew. He said that it is important for us to support her and look out for her welfare. There are many difficulties and stresses that she must face that we don’t always realize.
- For the second year in a row, the General Conference of the UMC, which occurs once every four years, has been postponed. The burning question consuming this particular session was the separation of the UMC into more than one denomination because of irreconcilable differences over the inclusion of LGBTQ persons as clergy and as married persons. The Bishop said that we cannot know what precisely will happen, but it is certain that the church will not be what it was before. Many individual churches are already breaking away and forming their own denominations. The conservative branch had already created an organizational plan. There is also an ultra-progressive branch that is pulling away. The denomination will be significantly smaller than it was. This is not a bad thing. It can mean that we will be leaner, more concentrated, more nimble and responsive, and ultimately, more effective.
- One of the topics the Conference is studying in its efforts to combat racism, is reparations. The Bishop said that some ways reparations can be made is through salary equity for clergy. There are Black clergypersons whose salaries are only half of that of white clergy, although they are pastoring congregations of equal size. Likewise, the real estate of some urban churches is exceedingly expensive to maintain, and parsonages are in deplorable condition. It is the intent of the Conference to correct that situation, so there is not a white privilege of housing and salary that defies all logic.
- Cornerstone’s intent to hire an Associate Pastor for outreach to the Latinx community is fully supported by the Conference and Cabinet.

PEACE WITH JUSTICE SUNDAY IS MAY 30, 2021

When you support Peace with Justice Sunday, your gift becomes a voice for advocacy around the world. Together we strengthen God’s family with ministries that challenge structures of inequality and empower people and communities through systemic change.

For example, in Washington, DC, Peace with Justice funds, through the BaltimoreWashington Annual Conference, support Hughes Memorial United Methodist Church’s Community Anti-violence Project (C.A.P.).

To help address a long litany of violence in the community, Hughes UMC joined with Howard University School of Law to begin an after-school program to help at-risk children and youth who live in the community surrounding the church.



Students participating in the Community Anti-violence Project have shown improved reading scores and other advancements. But Johnson is also convinced that “in our community there is no peace because there is no justice, and there is no justice because there is no peace.” C.A.P. is committed to peace with justice.

Global Peace with Justice grants include:

- An East Congo roundtable to discuss equitable educational justice—especially how to address the illiteracy that makes Pygmies vulnerable to deception and exploitation,
- “Letting Girls Be Girls” health education programming and services for young girls in the Rotifunk community of Sierra Leone, and
- An Economic Empowerment program for Gypsy women in Canon Nagar, India.
